## HOW TO REST?

In the Beloved's debut we are shown two paths to rest. Both are tandem traditions passed down from the earliest Christians to the present.

- 1. Communion: John puts the Eucharists derived from the Greek words "eu" (good) and "charis" (grace) in the feeding of the 5,000 where he says, "Whoever feeds on my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me, and I in him." (6:56). Rest then comes from receiving the gift of communion and remembering Christ.
- 2. Hesychasm: Hesychasm is a form of Christian prayer that emerged in second century. The term comes from the Greek word which means rest and inner stillness.
- The Jesus Prayer: The repetitive use of the Prayer of the Heart, "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me, a sinner," is a central practice in Hesychasm, which distills to whispering the name of Jesus over and over.
- Stillness and Silence: Hesychasts aim to cultivate inner stillness, silencing the noise and distractions of the external world in order to experience God's presence within.
- Unceasing Prayer: Hesychasts aspire to maintain an "abiding" continual state of prayer throughout their daily activities, extending beyond formal times of devotion.

For the next 15 minutes baptize every thought, feeling, and interruption in the name of Jesus by saying it aloud, "Jesus."

Let yourself become aware of his Presence and slowly breath his name. Inhale "Je" and exhale "sus" Every time you say his name sense after his presence.

The longer this prayer goes the deeper one's reflections become, until the name of God seems burrowed within the soul. Professor and Psychologist Olga Louchakova-Schwartz has documented cases of mental healings, addiction deliverances, life transformation, and miracles through the Jesus Prayer (Hesychasm).

Articles, books, and even seminars on the Jesus Prayer cannot substitute for just jumping in. The best place of learning is just doing it though.

# WHAT ARE OPT-IN MOMENTS?

Tim Goodman, Television Critic for the Chronicle wrote: There is a theory of complex, mythological or science fiction-oriented television series that centers on a viewer's willingness to "opt in." The idea is that you start watching a series, something out of the ordinary happens, and you have to make a decision on whether to continue watching. The main character dies, something odd challenges the viewer to shut it off or commit to watching. These moments are the moments of what cult classics are made up of. Are you going to see where it goes or turn the channel? If you keep watching you cross a point of no return

The Fourth Gospel does this over and over with the disciples, whittling down, thinning the herd, culling the pack. John is interested in becoming beloved, discovering and developing our true self. He keeps trimming the false narratives as he moves us closer and closer to the hour of glory. The disciples who start out following because of water to wine, get whittled a bit when Jesus cleanses the temple. The disciples who flock to eat fish and bread in the wilderness, walk out at the call to eat Jesus' flesh and drink his blood. By the time of the last supper there remains only last opt-in moment.

#### OPT IN MOMENT



#### John 12:42-50

Imagine: Read the above Scripture slowly (3x's). In the first reading notice the challenge or opt-in moment. After the third reading note the word(s) that stick(s) out to you.

**Feel:** Pray and express your feelings to God about the words that stuck out to you. This can include your desires, confessions, questions, gratitudes, or any resistance you have.


**Think:** Why do you think the Spirit highlighted those words to you? Where else in Scripture or your life have those words/themes come up? What message might God be conveying to you?

**Be Still:** Sit silently for 5 minutes. Just be in God's presence. Focus your attention on the Presence of God that accompanies the words of the Scripture; that is with you and in you. Be at peace with the Holy Spirit.

**Act:** What one action will you take today in response to this word?



#### **Seven Stages of Response to Jesus**





In John people are moving up or down these stages. They are fluid. For example, one can move from foe to friendly or friendly to foe.




Fruitbearing seems to be a point of no return

John is written with a literary device called "representative figures". This means people and groups symbolize a certain kind of response to Jesus. The following show the seven responses to Jesus in John.

- 1. **Foe**: "The Jews" Rejection of the religious elite and crowds.
- 2. **Friendly**: Acceptance without commitment (Jospeh, Nicodemus, Pilate)
- 3. **Fan**: Acceptance of Jesus as a miracle-worker (lame man, parents of the blind man)
- 4.**Followers**: Belief in Jesus' words (Samaritan woman, royal official, blind man)
- 5. **Apprentices**: Commitment to grow and continue in spite of misunderstanding. (Nathanael, Thomas, Peter, Philip, Thomas, Mary, Martha)
- 6. **Fruit-bearers:** Commitment to love one another, serve one another and bear fruit (Peter)
- 7. **Belovedness** —oneness with Jesus. Unity with Jesus. One at last supper, at cross, at empty tomb, at miraculous catch, and following.

## WHAT IS REST?

This week's devotional is meant to bring us to a place of spiritual rest. In the Gospel of John, the words "rest," "abide," and "recline" carry distinct meanings and convey important theological and relational concepts.

- 1. At the Father's side: This means to be one in heart and breath with God (bosom). In John's Gospel, Jesus rests at the Father's side and therefore can make him known to the world (1:18). The Beloved Disciple reclines/rests at Christ's side, during the betrayal scene and at the cross. This is a picture of being unrattled, undeterred, having found the safe place in God.
- 2. Abide: The term "abide" is used extensively in the Gospel of John, and it signifies a close, ongoing relationship with Jesus Christ. From the beginning of the disciples journey in John 1 "where do you abide?" to the final "abide in my love" Jesus seeks a lifestyle of oneness. For instance, in John 15:4, Jesus says, "Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me." "Abiding" conveys the idea of remaining in the spirit of Jesus and not merely doing religious deeds.

After the third reading note the word(s) that stick(s) out to you.

**Feel:** Pray and express your feelings to God about the words that stuck out to you. This can include your desires, confessions, questions, gratitudes, or any resistance you have.

**Think:** Why do you think the Spirit highlighted those words to you? Where else in Scripture or your life have those words/themes come up? What message might God be conveying to you?

**Be Still:** Sit silently for 5 minutes. Just be in God's presence. Focus your attention on the Presence of God that accompanies the words of the Scripture; that is with you and in you. Be at peace with the Holy Spirit.




